"We average about 15-20 people. But our biggest and favorite get-together is July 4. We rope off the cul-de-sac and have quite the party! It's also a perfect opportunity to have any new neighbors come on over and meet everyone." Some of the activities include a street hockey game and water balloon fights. They all move their barbecues out into the street and make a day of it.

"We end the night by looking up and watching the fireworks display from the community center – we have a perfect view. It really is our favorite get-together," Tennell added.

Another favorite time of year is Christmas. The entire neighborhood thinks they have the best decorations around.

"Besides all of us decorating each of our homes, we have made it a must to have a Christmas light thread. What we do is start at the beginning and this one strand of lights go around the entire block. Not one break, we go from one end, around the cul-de-sac and back up to the end of the other side. I don't think any other tract of homes does a group effort like this. We also host a progressive holiday dinner," Tennell said.

And for those reading this who would love to have this type of closeness on their own street? Ron Cormack

recommends just getting out there and start talking to your neighbors. He should know. He and wife Doris are original owners who've watched the group grow in number and closeness since they moved in back in 1985.
